





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How You Can Be Safer

We live in a different world than we did before September 11, 2001. We are more aware of our vulnerabilities, more appreciative of our freedoms, and more understanding that we have a personal responsibility for the safety of our families, our neighbors and our nation.

But we also know that we can take action now to help protect our families, help reduce the impact an emergency has on our lives, and help deal with the chaos if an incident does occur.

Review the Citizen Preparedness Publications to learn about creating a Family Disaster Plan (PDF) and preparing a Family Disaster Supplies Kit (PDF) to last for at least 3 days, including drinkable water, non-perishable food (including pet food), first aid supplies, other emergency supplies like flashlights and batteries, clothes and bedding, and specialty items. Disaster Supply Kits should also be prepared for your car and workplace.

And get involved in helping others be safer -- when you help your neighbor, you help your country. Share what you learn with others -- and participate in Citizen On Patrol in your area. If you don't have a Citizens On Patrol program in your area, contact www.ccopa.ca for the provincial representative and work with your local officials to get one started.

Here are some other things you can do right now to be safer!

- Check and change the batteries in your smoke alarms and replace all alarms that are more than 10 years old.
- Make sure you know where your local fire department, police station, and hospital are and post a list of emergency phone numbers posted near all the telephones in your home.
- Organize and practice a family fire drill -- make sure your children know what your smoke detector sounds like and what to do if it goes off when they are sleeping.

- Locate the utility mains for your home and be sure you know how to turn them off manually: gas, electricity, and water.
- Create an emergency plan for your household, including your pets. Decide where your family will meet if a disaster does happen: 1) right outside your home in case of a sudden emergency, like a fire and 2) outside your neighborhood in case you can't return home -- ask an out of town friend to be your "family contact" to relay messages.
- Prepare a 3-day disaster supply kit, complete with flashlights, batteries, blankets, and an emergency supply of water and food (and pet food!).
- Plan to hold a Neighborhood Watch meeting -- your local law enforcement can help you get started.
- Check the expiration dates of all over-the-counter medications -- discard all that are expired and replace any that are routinely needed.
- Make sure all cleaning products and dangerous objects are out of children's reach.
- Plan to sign up for a first aid training course. Call your local Red Cross chapter or National Safety Council to ask about courses in your area (www.redcross.org).
- Visit with your neighbors and discuss how you would handle a disaster in your area. Talk to neighbors with special needs and help them become safer too!

Police Week in Nova Scotia

Police week is an annual event that takes place the 2nd week of May. This is where the police and the community come together.

I had the privilege this year of attending two events, one at "H" Division on May 13th in the new RCMP Building in Dartmouth, NS.

This was very well attended with booths for Citizens On Patrol with 3 groups in attendance. There were 2 members from the Cold Harbour group, 2 members from the Tantallon group and 3 members from the East Hants group. As well, Crime Stoppers, MADD, Auxiliary Members, Veterans RCMP Association, Victim Services, Dog Master and his side kick, RCMP Youth group, Training Officers, Finger print members, members from the Forensic lab and also a group called "Adopt A Book" were all in attendance. The event ran for 4 hours.

There were many young people and lots and lots of kids. Among the members walking about were the CO Brian Brennan, and other top- ranking members in and out of uniform. Outside the building were patrol cars with lights flashing, a rescue boat with members, and the armoured vehicle with members present to answer questions from the public. The children really like this event and there were lots there, I lost count of the number of Boys Scouts, Cubs, Beaver, Girl Guides, Brownies and Sparks. I'm sure they brought them in in Bus loads. The parents and chaperons were just as interested as the youth with the volunteer programs that are under the RCMP umbrella.

The Adopt A Book was started by RCMP members years ago in New Glasgow Pictou County and it is a very successful program. I had the honor of meeting this officer about 15 yrs. ago when he started this program.

The next event I was part of on May 16th was in East Hants at the Enfield Detachment. What a beautiful day. COP's were there with their digital speed sign and members handing out brochures to the public. MADD members were present as well as Crime Stoppers, Victim Services, Fire Department and the usual number of uniformed police officers, with the Staff Sargent giving the public tours of the cells (there were no guests in the cells). Police cars, which the kids dearly love, had the lights and sirens going. Volunteers and members of the Fire Department were cooking and serving hot dogs and water. The Fire Department had an exercise where they were getting someone out of a crashed vehicle. This event was very successful as all the public events during police week are.

Other Detachments and the Regional Police also have their events. I know that Tantallon Community Police Officer was going to be in a Mall on the Friday and Mt. Uniacke was going to be in another Mall. These members are from the COP groups in their community.

Manitoba Citizens On Patrol

Citizens On Patrol in Manitoba continue to be committed to community safety. As of January 2015 the Program had 55 groups in communities across the Province. The 1200 members provided 30,000 hours of volunteer service for 2014. Some groups are growing while others are having difficulty recruiting new members.

COP members are assisting with community events in addition to patrols which provide them with more public visibility. Residents realize the value of COP and consider becoming a member when they see the benefit to their community by volunteering their time and the satisfaction they gain by assisting Law Enforcement to make their community a safer place.

COP members also assist by providing traffic control for community events and do school crossing patrols and street patrols on foot with RCMP. They also assist Manitoba Public Insurance with the Speed Watch Program and assist the RCMP Traffic Division by taking part in Distracted Driving campaigns for seatbelt and cellphone use.

Starting up of new COP Groups and training of new members as well as updates of training are continuing as needed. Trained COP members assist the Provincial Coordinator with these responsibilities wherever possible. Sessions for periodic refresher of training are recommended to all groups.

COP groups in areas of the Province near Lake Manitoba are preparing for possible Spring flooding again this year. The COP members provided security and sandbagging assistance in the cottage and residential areas along the waterfront.

The Manitoba Provincial Advisory Committee (PAC), at their last meeting discussed a Strategic Plan for future increased capability and responsibilities for the Regional Representatives which may assist the Provincial Coordinator. More discussion is planned to ensure the best possible practices are in place for the COP Program in Manitoba.

One COP Group in Northern Manitoba was pleased to be a part of an event that made a historical inroad into the Metis culture. A signing ceremony was held with Federal, Provincial and Municipal dignitaries, RCMP and the Metis Federation leaders as well as members of the community in attendance to pass on the position of Staff Sgt. in the community from father to son. The departing RCMP Staff Sgt. worked closely with the local COP Group and the new RCMP Staff Sgt. continues to provide support for the local members of the COP Program as his father did.

The Provincial Coordinator for Manitoba Citizens On Patrol for the past six to seven years has transferred to a new position with Manitoba Public Insurance so a new Coordinator will be hired this year. It will be a learning curve for the new person due to the number of COP groups in the Province with a large number of volunteers. We are confident the Groups will work effectively with the new person. Manitoba COP volunteers continue to patrol with dedication to their communities.

B.C. Report

A retirement party was held Friday May 22, 2015 for Sgt. Bernie Smandych of "E" Division (BC) who is retiring after 35 years (it was a joint retirement as her husband was retiring from the BC Sheriffs also). Approximately 140 people gathered at the new (3 year old) headquarters for the RCMP in BC in Surrey. An informal open bar was followed by a huge buffet dinner (it was called a tail-gate with corn bread, smokies etc.), presentations, and lots of thank you's.

I was one of a few volunteers invited and it was a special moment to be in their presence. Sgt. Smandych was the best supporter one could have when running a COPs program. She was always right there when I needed something and went out of her way to be part of our program. When the RCMP needed up-to-date information on the COPs programs in BC, she arranged a 4 month contract for me to undertake this task.

Sgt. Smandych has had a great and varied working career. She went into training July 15, 1980 with her first posting to Swan Hills, Alberta followed by service to the community of Canmore, also in Alberta.

Enough of that urban policing, she transferred north to get a feel of the how our friends in a remote part of Canada live. In July 1984, she went up to the Northwest Territories to serve the Communities of Yellowknife, Spence Bay (now called Taloyoak) and Pine Point (a Cominco Mine town that went from Boom to shutting down in 1987).

Back to urban policing, she transferred to the University Detachment (UBC) in July 1988 and served there for 5 years after which she moved to the Mission Detachment for three years.

Another move came when she moved to the Ridge Meadows Detachment where she received her Cpl. promotion. Her last posting is her retiring location at "E" Division Crime Prevention Services where she came in 2006 and where she was promoted to Sgt. Her official retirement is July after 35 years of Service with the RCMP.

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She will be missed by many people but will be remembered as the kind of supporter all of our COP groups would love to have.

British Columbia continues to be running contrary to the rest of Canada. At the Nanaimo detachment, the Citizens on Patrol program has all but disappeared with the consequential loss of some talented patrollers who decided that the new direction did not fit for them. Along with the cancellation of the program was the suspension of the Lock Out Auto Crime initiative and our bike unit. A difficult time for some of us who just want to volunteer with the experience and talents they have learned over the years. In one other detachment, all night patrols have been suspended for reasons unknown although I understand it may be a lack of supervision. Possibly with a high crime rate, there is a safety issue but I know that day patrols are still taking place and they require supervision.

Provincially, we have not made any headway in our goal to become a strong voice in British Columbia. I had hoped that with the new President of the BC Crime Prevention Association being an inspector with the Vancouver City Police Department, and with the City of Vancouver having the largest Crime Watch group, we might expect a stronger organizational body to bring the volunteers on their way to forming a provincial body similar to that of other provinces with COPs and Crime Watch as that voice. However, the BCCPA Board again has confirmed that this will not happen and will continue to run contrary to what is happening across Canada. However, as long as we continue to keep in contact with each other, we will continue to grow with our goal to create a BC Association of volunteers run by volunteers. Our Secretary is from BC and welcomes your comments from your local group.

Crime Prevention Specialist Training

On May 11, 12 and 13 training took place in Red Deer, Alberta. The training was made available through the International Society of Crime Prevention Practitioners and was attended by eight participants including ACOPA President Bev Salomons and Dave Pfeiffer, C.O.P. member from Beaumont and Leduc.

Training topics included History of Crime Prevention, Three Lines of Defense, Armed Robbery Prevention, Auto Theft (Carjacking), Child Safety, Credit Card Fraud, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), Crimes Against Older Adults, Domestic Violence, Identify Theft, Lighting for Security, Neighbourhood Watch, Public Speaking, Security Surveys, Sexual Assault, Cheque Fraud, Construction Site Crime Prevention, Crime Analysis, Gang Awareness, Internet Safety and Cyber Crime Prevention, Crime Prevention for Multi Housing Communities, Operation Identification, Personal Safety, Rural Crime Prevention, School Safety – Emergency Response, Retail Fraud Prevention, Volunteers and Crime Prevention and Workplace Violence Prevention.

Bruce Wall from Phoenix and Becky Wylie-Jardine, a retired RCMP officer from Red Deer were the trainers. To add to the information presented, there was two evenings of studying for the final test of 200 questions with a mark of 75% to pass. This was an excellent course to take to learn about so many crime prevention topics; all of which are useful to the Citizens On Patrol program.
